## 1.- F.- DANGERS OF NEW TECHNOLOGIES

Teenagers who send more than 120 text messages a day are more likely to have sex, drink, use drugs, and get into fights, a new study has found. The research from the Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio, found there was a strong link between "hyper-texting" and "risky behavior". Lead researcher Dr Scott Frank said one of the causes of excessive messaging could be poor parenting.
